Fáilte! *Ireland: Music & Culture* will take you on a journey of song, rhythm, and culture from Ireland. In this hands-on assembly students will sing in Irish/Gaelic, clap and tap along to infectious jig and reel rhythms, and learn the chorus to a song about Ireland's most famous goat!

Learning Objectives: Students will . . .

- Identify the native language of Ireland, and speak a basic greeting in Irish/Gaelic
- Learn about the Irish drum, the *bodhrán* (pronounced bow-rawn)
- Clap to and learn to recognize jig (6/8) and reel (4/4) rhythms
- Sing the chorus to a song in Irish/Gaelic
- Have fun!

Preliminary Activities

- Geography

 - Ireland is an island in the North Atlantic Ocean that is the most westerly part of Europe.
 It's the closest European Union country to the United States.
 - The Wild Atlantic Way, at 1,553 miles (2,500 km), follows the western coast of Ireland and is the longest coastal scenic drive route in the world.
 - Dublin is the capital of Ireland.
 - Ireland consists of 32 counties. Six of these are in the northeast portion of the island, and are part of the United Kingdom.

History

- Similar to Americans, the people of Ireland have ancestors from many lands, including from Norway, Denmark, England and France for example.

Culture

- Sport is very popular in Ireland. There are three indigenous sports: Gaelic football, handball, and hurling. Here is a link to a brief history of hurling, which is over 3,000 years old and the fastest field game in the world:

- Ireland is also one of the strongest competitors in the world at rugby.
- Surfing is very popular in Ireland. Known to surfers as a "cold paradise," this sport was first documented on the island in 1949.
- Music and social dancing is a part of daily Irish life.

Language/vocabulary

- Ireland is a bilingual nation, with both Irish/Gaelic and English spoken and used as official languages. After Brexit, it is the only remaining English-speaking country in the European Union.
- Irish/Gaelic is one of the oldest languages in the world, and has the oldest vernacular literature of any language in Western Europe, dating back to the 5th century. Irish/Gaelic is a member of the Celtic branch of Indo-European languages.

Tradition

- Irish traditional music was seen as something for the poorer country folk until the mid-20th century. Today, a large percentage of Irish children study and perform traditional music.
- Blarney Castle is one of the most popular historic monuments in the world, and is the location of the famous Blarney Stone, which dates to 1446.
- Halloween and St. Patrick's Day are popular holidays in the United States that originated in Ireland.

Follow-Up Activities

Ask your students to . . .

- Share with a family member or friend one thing you learned and one thing you liked.
- Look for items you can use around your house to make your own bodhrán
- Practice your new Irish/Gaelic vocabulary words with a family member or friend:
 - Fáilte Romhat (You're welcome)
 - Slán (Goodbye)
- Sing the song *An Poc ar Buile* to someone in your home or class.
- Explain the role of music in American culture.
- Give examples of music in your life.
- Discuss the role music has in expressing your identity (family, culture, gender, hobbies, etc).
- What more would you like to learn about Ireland?
